
Compatriot Robert Lusk also attended the Monroe birthday celebration at Oak Grove.

The Tea Act 250th anniversary

The Richmond Chapter commemorated the 250th anniversary of the Tea Act at its May meeting. Choosing to serve iced coffee instead of iced tea, President Yohn presented an overview of the historic significance of the Tea Act, then challenged attendees: “Now, as you’ve no doubt noticed, we’ve taken steps to support our Patriot Ancestors in protesting this outrageous monopoly and ongoing tax by serving iced coffee at today’s meeting instead of iced tea.



“Those in attendance today have a special and unique opportunity to shape the course of our chapter’s future proceedings. I propose we continue to boycott tea and, instead, serve iced coffee at our meetings for the remainder of the year. Who among us is willing to show that unity of support in remembrance of the very real struggles faced by our Patriot ancestors? All in favor please signify by saying aye!”

The resolution passed *unanimously* and the chapter commemorated the occasion with a group photo.

50 years a Compatriot

Howard marks a half-century as a member of the Richmond Chapter, Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution on June 29. He was kind enough to share his thoughts and memories on being a member for fully half of the chapter's existence. . .

I was all of 26 years old when I joined the SAR. My membership certificate was signed by Thomas Paige Nelson, a direct descendent of Yorktown's famed Revolutionary War hero and Virginia wartime Governor Thomas Nelson Jr.



When I joined, in 1973, the Virginia Society kept its headquarters in the Jefferson Hotel, here in Richmond.

The Richmond Chapter was led by Joseph Cottrell. We often met in the meeting rooms off the Franklin Street side of the hotel, adjacent to the present-day Lemaire restaurant. We also occasionally met in a private club in the basement of the hotel, at the Richmond Engineer's Club and at Mrs. Morton's Tea Room, all on Franklin Street.

The Chapter held several signature events, including: Spring Garden Parties at the Branch Cabel House on Monument Avenue, Patrick Henry's Liberty or Death speech commemorations at St. John's Church and an annual bell-ringing at First Baptist Church in honor of the Fourth of July. Chapter member Earl Bethel was a Deacon at First Baptist and he coordinated the event. I had the honor of ringing that bell for the chapter for several years and I can state the bell actually rang me and lifted me off the ground several times.

Back then, I was one of the younger members of the Richmond Chapter and wondered to myself why was I in the company of so many prominent and impressive men. Men like Rod Brown, James Sudeth, John Crouch, Flavius B. Walker, Malvern Omohundro, Reverend William Lister, Dr. William Thurman, James Cremins, Robert Morse, Dr. William B. Fitzhugh and many more whose names have faded from my memory. All those patriots are gone now except for me and my dear friend and SAR brother Brian Miller.

I served in many chapter positions, over the years. I edited the chapter newsletter and roster. I served as Chapter Secretary, Second and First Vice President and, eventually as President, in 1980. I also served as State Secretary for many years working with my dear friend Mrs. Marie Franko who served as Executive Secretary.

Some of my fondest memories are of our annual trips to Yorktown, especially the year President Ronald Reagan was the keynote speaker. French President Francois Mitterand and Governor John Dalton also made remarks. Elements of the French and American fleets were in the York River and a large military parade followed. I can still see that day clearly in my mind's eye. I was so proud to be an American and a member of the SAR.

Our own Roderick Brown was a member of the Yorktown Day Commission and received the National SAR Gold Good Citizenship Medal for his extraordinary efforts in putting the program together.

Another highlight was the State Convention when Bill Lister had Major General George S. Patton IV as the guest of honor. I can still see him coming down the staircase at the Jefferson as we greeted him in the receiving line and the Army band serenaded us from the balcony above. Reverend Lister had worked for the Stars and Stripes newspaper and was a friend of General Patton's father during World War II.

As President, I also hosted a meeting at the Defense General Supply Center Officer's Club, here in Richmond. The speaker was Dr. John E. Monahan from the University of Virginia and his wife was Anna Anderson, who proclaimed she was Anastasia - sole surviving daughter of Tsar Nicholas of Russia. Dr. Monahan did all the talking but, sitting up on the dais, I could see his wife kicking him under the table when he said something she didn't agree with.

Having been a member for the last 50 of our 100-year history, I am so very encouraged by what lies ahead for the next decades. My advice is to attract new and younger members and put them to work. In the words of my former Vietnam General, "Many hands make easy work."

The SAR has remained faithful to its charter at the National, State and Chapter levels. It is our duty to our ancestors to continue their legacy of patriotism, loyalty and duty.

Compatriots, I wish you well. Our motto remains LIBERTAS ET PATRIA.




The SAR Brand Purpose



