

250th Anniversary

First Continental Congress

Philadelphia, Historic Carpenters Hall, October 13, 2024. Ken Bonner represented the chapter by participating in Color Guard and presenting the chapter wreath. The 1st Continental Congress convened September 5 and met through October 26. Virginia Delegates were: Richard Bland, Benjamin Harrison, Patrick Henry, Richard Henry Lee, Edmund Pendleton, Peyton Randolph and George Washington. Peyton Randolph was elected President. The principle outcome of the Congress was the passage of the Continental Association. They also adopted the Suffolk Resolves, a measure from counties in Massachusetts declaring grievances against the Crown, a boycott of English goods, and a request that each Colony establish and train a militia. The ceremony was held at Carpenters Hall. Attendees had the opportunity. to tour the Hall and see the rooms where delegates met 250 years ago.

Patriot Grave Marking Charles Thomson.

Philadelphia, **October 13** Charles Thomson was secretary of the Continental Congress from 1774-1789. Mr. Thomson was born in Ireland in 1729, then migrated to the American Colonies in 1739 with his father and brothers. Mr. Thomson served as the only secretary to the Continental Congress and was at Philadelphia's Independence Hall when the Declaration of Independence was signed. The first published version of the Declaration included his name and role as Secretary. Thomson drew and submitted a proposal for the Great Seal of the United States. With some modifications his design was adopted by Congress.

Thomson was admired by Founding Fathers including John Adams who considered Thomson to be the Samuel Adams of Philadelphia. He was an ally of Benjamin Franklin and a member of the Philadelphia Sons of Liberty. Thompson spoke out against Britain's various Intolerable Acts and was an outspoken, and active proponent of Independence.

Thomson is buried at Laurel Hill Cemetery west of Philadelphia. He died in 1824. The last home he occupied is named "Harriton House", built in 1704 by Rowland Ellis. The next owner was Richard Harrison, father of Hannah Harrison Thomson, Charles Thomson's 2nd wife. He married Hannah September 1, 1774, shortly before the First Continental Congress convened.

The Philadelphia Chapter Pennsylvania SAR sponsored the Grave Marking for Charles Thomson. Ken Bonner represented the chapter. He participated in Color Guard, presented the chapter wreath, and was in the firelock squad volley.

HISTORIC COMMEMORATION 200th Anniversary of the Return of Lafayette to Yorktown

Yorktown, Friday, October 18 A re-enactment of Major General Lafayette's arrival at Yorktown in October 1824 was celebrated at the Yorktown waterfront. The General was delivered to Yorktown by the tall masted ship Luna. A Virginia Sons of the American Revolution Color Guard advanced colors to open a ceremony honoring General Lafayette's arrival. The General was portrayed by Mark Schneider. After the General's remarks, a Sons of the American Revolution squad formed on the walk near the break water and executed a thirteen shot flintlock salute The salute was executed by each squad member firing a round, then the next member, then the next, until thirteen shots were fired. A dinner honoring Lafayette was held at the Yorktown Museum of the American Revolution the evening of October 18.. Ken Bonner and Barry Schwoerer represented the chapter at all events on October 18.

Dulles International Airport October 23. 250th ANNIVERSARY First Continental Congress (Local)

Old Town Aldie, October 27 At the 1810 vintage home of Chapter applicant Tucker Withers in Old Town Aldi, the Sgt Maj John Champe Chapter performed a skit summarizing the Accomplishments of the First Continental Congress. Players in Colonial Attire read their parts. David Welker played Secretary Charles Thomson, Steve Riddle portrayed President Peyton Randolph, Jim Watts played Reverend Jacob Duché, Mark Sink played Patrick Henry, Warner Workman played John Adams, Valerie Sink (Lanes Mill Chapter DAR) played Hannah Thomson, and Barry Schwoerer was the narrator. Randolph and Thomson discussed the accomplishments of the Congress including adopting the Continental Association; Reverend Duché recreated his prayer that greatly impressed the delegates; John Adams read a letter to his wife, Abigail, summarizing the impact Duche's prayer had on delegates; Patrick Henry recreated his remarks to Congress "The distinctions between Virginians, Pennsylvanians, New Yorkers, and New Englanders, are no more. I am not a Virginian, but an American." Mark Sink as Patrick Henry also recreated the last part of Henry's famous "Give me Liberty or Give me Death Speech" as the narrator summarized the impact of the Congress and events to come. The audience stomped, cheered and clapped at Henry's remarks. Hannah Thomson (Valerie Sink) brought news of Resolves issued by 51 ladies of Edenton, NC.

The skit was performed 250 years and one day after the First Continental Congress adjourned from Carpenters Hall in Philadelphia.

HISTORIC COMMEMORATION Virginia SAR Honors Susanna Bolling, Virginia's Paul Revere

North Chesterfield, VA October 27. One evening in May 1781 a sixteen year old girl overheard a plot to capture Major General Lafayette, commander of Revolutionary War Continental Forces in Virginia. Susanna Bolling left her home, rowed across the Appomattox River, then borrowed a friend's horse to make the ride to warn Lafayette.

On October 27, 2024 the Richmond Chapter, Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution sponsored a ceremony that dedicated a sign commemorating Susanna's act of bravery. By making the ride, she became the Paul Revere of Virginia. The sign reads:

"HERO OF THE REVOLUTION: Susanna Bolling was 16 when British General Cornwallis Quartered in her City Point, Hopewell, VA home. She overheard him plotting to capture Continental Army General Lafayette who headquartered here at the Half Way House. Susanna snuck out of her home, crossed the Appomattox River and rode almost 10 miles through the night to warn Lafayette who escaped. Susanna's heroism allowed Lafayette to continue leading the Virginia Campaign which ended with Cornwallis in Yorktown and set the Stage for the Decisive American Victory"

The sign was dedicated at the Halfway House where Lafayette had his headquarters. The house was built in 1760, still stands and today is the Halfway House Restaurant at 10301 Jefferson Davis Highway, North Chesterfield, VA. The Virginia General Assembly declared December 5, Susanna's birthday, as Susanna Bolling Day throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia.
