Barry was born in 1946 in Calaveras County, California, home of Mark Twain's Story "The Jumping Frog of Calaveras". He holds an Associates Degree in Electronics Technology, a Bachelor of Science in Industrial Technology (electronics), and a Masters Degree in Communications Engineering. He met his wife of 55 years while in College. They have two sons, Sean and Kevin, eight grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

He spent 27 years in the United States Navy flying off of aircraft Carriers in the A-3 Skywarrior and S-3 Viking. He Commanded VS-38 onboard USS Ranger and then was Commanding Officer/Major Program Manager for the Navy Global Positioning System. After Navy, he worked in Industry where he was assigned as Vice President Navy Engineering Services. He retired in 2007.

Compatriots,

John Lynch and I have been researching and working toward holding a grave marking ceremony for two Revolutionary War soldiers. Cpt William Harwar Parker and Cpt James McIlhany are buried in the McIlhany Family Cemetery in Loudoun County. To the best of my knowledge, our chapter has never sponsored a patriot grave marking and we're excited about it.

We located the cemetery near Hillsboro and partnered with the Sgt Maj John Champe chapter to survey the badly neglected site. We requested and finally received permission from the landowner to perform some work to make the cemetery presentable for a ceremony.

Compatriot Barry Schwoerer and I spent a couple days working there last week. We cut fallen trees, saplings, and grapevines. We removed briars, weeds, and undergrowth and raked out debris from the confines and perimeter. We restacked fallen stones from the fence.

Basically, we did all the work within our senior capabilities. There remain several large dead/dying trees and limbs that should be removed. We received a reasonable estimate from a local firm to remove those - price \$1260.

So, I am asking for your support in whatever level you feel comfortable with. It's a great project for our chapter to get involved with. The ceremony has been set for Sunday May 21st at 2 pm. I hope you can make a contribution and also consider making the trip north to attend. There are more details on the Member Clicks calendar.

IN MEMORIAM

James Lindsay Talley

APRIL 22, 1936 - NOVEMBER 4, 2022







Born on 22 April 1936 in Denison, Texas, Jim passed away at his home in Williamsburg, Va., on Friday morning, 4 November 2022 from complications of ALS. In addition to Phyllis, his wife of 56 years, Jim is survived by his daughter Janet, his son Michael, their families, and a large Australian/New Zealand family. Jim, the only child of Lindsay and Myrhl (Eloise) Talley, graduated from Tulane University in June 1958 with a B.Sc. Degree and received his commission into the US Navy at that time. At the Tulane Naval Reserve ROTC review, Jim received the Capt. John S. Sareussen Award for outstanding leadership and executive ability. He was commander of his ROTC unit, Vice President of both his junior and sophomore classes and President of the Kappa Sigma Fraternity chapter. He was listed in Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities, and was a proud Son of the American Revolution.

The Federalist Papers is a collection of 85 articles and essays written by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay to promote the ratification of the Constitution of the United States. The Federalist articles appeared in three New York newspapers: The Independent Journal, the New-York Packet, and the Daily Advertiser, beginning on October 27, 1787. Although written and published with haste, The Federalist articles were widely read and greatly influenced the shape of American political institutions. Because the essays were initially published in New York, most of them begin with the same salutation: "To the People of the State of New York".

Widely considered to be among the most important historical collections of all time. The Federalist Papers were intended to persuade New York at-large delegates to the Constitutional Convention to accept the newly drafted Constitution in 1787. Authored in parts by Hamilton, Madison, and Jay, together as the pseudonym of Publius, the documents have been referred to and heavily cited countless times in all aspects of American government and politics. Together, the eighty-five Federalist essays stand among the Constitution of the United States, the Declaration of Independence, Common Sense, and other work by the Founding Fathers that helped build and solidify the foundation of American democracy.

With its rich history and a new introduction from Alan Dershowitz, one of the most prominent legal minds in the country. The Federalist Papers will educate you on the groundwork that shaped the greatest country in the world.

Here are a few "SAR rules of the road" for submitting a supplemental application, which will hopefully save you time and the registrar as well:

- *Use SAR or DAR record copies for proof of lineage and patriot's service when possible
- *Data listed on page one must be supported by documents or not listed
- *Acceptable proof documents include birth, death and marriage certificates, census records, wills, family Bibles, court records, obituaries, tombstones and published books
- *Documents must be legible, full page and document source provided
- *Do not provide redundant proof; do not write on documents
- *Family trees from ancestry or family search are not acceptable proof
- *Sar.org has support links to help, including the Application Preparation Guide
- *Current cost for a supplemental application is \$100 to NSSAR, \$12 to VASSAR and \$10 to Williamsburg Chapter SAR

Patriot Whitaker Campbell

My Patriot, a simple farmer who was 48 at the start of the Revolutionary War, was a recruiter in King and Queen County, Virginia and later provided supplies to the war effort.

Whitaker Campbell was born in King & Queen County, Virginia in 1727. His mother was Ann Whitaker; father is unknown. Public claims records indicate that he contributed support to the revolutionary cause by receipt from King & Queen Co representative Robert Hill, Comr. dated October 25, 1780 for 17 bushels & 2 ½ peck Rye. Another receipt dated March, 1781 is for one beef also signed by Robert Hill, Comr. Whitaker also was a Lieutenant in the King & Queen County militia. He was a recruiter for the county as documented in the Virginia Council Journal 1776-77,

He married Jane Hill (1730-1785) in 1760. I am descended from Alexander Campbell (1774-1829) the fourth child of that marriage. They had a large family with Jane Hill Campbell dying during the birth of their 9th child, Benjamin Campbell on November 27, 1785.

Whitaker Campbell married second, Martha de Shazo in 1786. They had at least 4 children. Whitaker lived the later part of his life at his home, Brewington, in King & Queen Co. He died there in 1814 and is said to be buried on a knoll near the site of the original house, a spot known as Campbell Hill.



All chapter members have put a significant amount of time in researching their Patriot. Adding Patriot biographies to the PRS is a way to honor your ancestors and possibly help other compatriots in their searches. It is also an easy way to support your chapter and only requires writing a paragraph or two about your Patriot. Whether your Patriot signed the Declaration of Independence, wintered at Valley Forge or simply supported the Revolution by providing supplies, all deserve our recognition. Flags of the American Revolution



The White Plains Flag 1776

This White Plains Flag, emblazoned with the Liberty cap and staff as well as the sword of Justice, was captured from a New York militia unit in the fall of 1776 by German mercenaries fighting for the English. Although the Germans belittled the American military skills, it is interesting to note that these very same Hessians were forced to surrender to General Washington at the Battles of Princeton and Trenton several months later.

The Liberty Cap was a tight-fitting hat that became a popular symbol for the fight for independence and freedom. It would often be carried on a staff during a parade or rally, and later became a common feature on early American coins.

The Williamsburg Chapter, Sons of the American Revolution, presented a NSSAR Flag Retirement Certificate to the Five Forks Ace Hardware on 18 May 2022. The store participates, along with American Legion Post 1776, in collecting soiled and worn flags for proper retirement. From the Chaplain Jim Morford



Among the indicators of where we are heading as a nation are public opinion polls that track the same questions over many years.

Recent polls confirm that patriotism, religious faith, and other basic American values that help define the national character are receding in importance to Americans.

According to the polls, patriotism (defined as love for or devotion to one's country) continues to decline. Just 38% of U.S. adults say they are "extremely proud" to be American-that is the lowest since Gallup began asking the question in 2001, pre-9/11-at that time 87% claimed to be "extremely" or "very" proud. Pride in the U.S. fell roughly 30% between 2011 and 2022. Nearly 247 years ago our nation was founded on Christian principles. A recent Wall Street Journal poll found that only 39% think religion is very important. This is down 62% from a poll taken in 1968. Church participation in America has declined more significantly in the past two decades. This trend is mainly driven by the increasing number of Americans, especially younger Americans, who express no religious preference. Today less than half of U.S. adults are members of a church, synagogue, or mosque.

Our democratic republic rests on a foundation of values rooted in the beliefs and visions of our Founding Fathers. They are: Individual Freedom, Self-Reliance, Equality of Opportunity, Competition, The American Dream, and Hard Work. The polls reflect not only a significant decline in the importance of patriotism and religious faith, but also other core values as well. These declines are not only a cause for concern but also a call to action for those who believe in preserving the greatness of our nation. Much of the responsibility falls to organizations such as SAR, DAR and other patriotic societies. All must redouble their efforts to promote patriotism and core American values as the last best hope for preserving our free and independent nation.
