By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

We selected two winners... one each in the Junior and Senior Divisions. Ms. Savannah Olshove was the Senior Division Winner with her individual performance... Thomas Jefferson: Garden Scientist. Mr. Walker Helms was the Junior Division winner with his individual performance... The Printing Press: Printing America to Freedom. There is an exciting amount of energy and enthusiasm at these competitions and you would enjoy watching the kids compete!

Alain Outlaw spoke at our April luncheon and brought us up to date on the Spencer's Ordinary, Green Spring and Church-On-The-Main sites. He also showed us some of the most recent artifacts which he has found. By far the most



exciting of these artifacts is a decorative brass plate from a martingale which has a Fleur de Leis and a Marquis' symbol. Lafayette had two horses shot out from under him at Green Spring, the brass plate was found in a place where he would have likely been and the evidence supports the theory that the plate came from one of Lafayette's horses.

Planning for our 31 May Memorial Day Ceremony with Colonial Williamsburg is advancing. We have reserved tables at the King's Arms Tavern for those desiring to have lunch together after the ceremony. Kings' Arms is quite close to the French burial site where the ceremony concludes. We plan to offer transportation from the Mathew Whaley Elementary School parking lot to the Kings' Arms parking lot for those who feel uncomfortable with walking the ceremony route (Palace, Bruton Parish to the French burial site near the Inn). ## Historian's Report

With Mother's Day falling in the month of May, I determined that "Women of the Revolution" by Robert M. Dunkerly, History Press, 2007, to be an appropriate selection "From the Historian's Bookshelf".

Robert Dunkerly, chief ranger of Moores Creek National Battlefield near Wilmington, North Carolina makes the point that "each of the Southern Revolutionary battlefields holds the history of soldiers and legends of women." From the wooded slopes of Kings Mountain to the fields of Cowpens; to the lesser known sites like Fishing Creek and Hanging Rock, Dunkerly uncovers the stories and legends surrounding the women who were caught up in the struggle. This book serves not only as a study of the battles, but also as a chronicle of the experiences of women in the eighteenth century. Women were present on nearly every battlefield, and their stories are told here for the first time.

As a personal footnote, the wife of my Revolutionary War ancestor, Captain Andrew Barry, Margaret Catherine "Kate" Moore Barry, is featured in the Cowpens chapter of this book. The Moore/Barry Plantation, Walnut Grove, is located south of Spartansburg, SC, in the village of Roebuck, and is now a State Park.
