We will then march behind our Color Guard (Bob Schmidt, OIC) and CW's Fife and Drum Corps to Bruton Parish Church, then on to the French burial site about 100 yards behind the CW Employees Parking Lot on Francis Street.

Joe Spruill is arranging a shuttle to the entrance of the path in front of Matthew Whaley School that leads to the Palace and, after the Palace portion of the ceremony, back to the entrance to King's Arms Tavern for those who are uncomfortable with walking the ceremony route. The Historian's Corner

The "From the Historian's Bookshelf "selection for the month of May is entitled, "Come to the Cow Pens!", Poetry and Prose by Christine R. Swager; Illustrations by John Robertson, Hub City Writers Project, Spartanburg, South Carolina 29305, 2002. Now, I can just imagine some of you saying, "Oh, no! Not another book about the Battle of Cowpens!" I would offer a word of caution not to prejudge this little book until you have read it! For starters, this book is a product of the Hub City Writers Project, a non-profit organization of Spartanburg, South Carolina, whose mission is to foster a sense of community through the literary arts. They do so by publishing books from and about their community; encouraging, mentoring, and advancing the careers of local writers; seeking to make Spartanburg a center for the literary arts.

The other surprise is that the book is more about the Partisans who fought at Cowpens than the Continental Army. The contention is that the American Revolution in South Carolina was a bloody struggle between Patriots (or Partisans) and Tories (Loyalists). It was a war of neighbor against neighbor, of brother against brother. The Partisans were true citizen soldiers who responded to their country's need when there was an enemy threat. When there was none, they returned to their homes and their fields. Mixing poetry and prose, Dr. Christine R. Swager presents to the reader a stirring account of these citizen soldiers and gives them the credit they are due for helping our nation win its independence. Also, the illustrations and maps by John Robertson are a superb enhancement to this work!

A good and quick read.
