By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

Construction will begin later this year with the bulk of it completed by 2015 and the balance by 2019..

Memorial Day - Monday May 30

Participants should arrive at the Governor's Palace Gate not later than 9:50 AM. The ceremony will begin at 10:00 AM. After remarks and the laying of wreaths at the Palace, the Fife and Drums will lead the march to the Palace Green Gate at Bruton Parish Church for a brief ceremony there. The march will then proceed to the French graveyard near the Providence Hall Guest Houses where the French soldiers are buried – about a 15 minute walk. The ceremonies there will end at about 11:00 AM.

We have a limited number of reserved tables for an 11:30 luncheon to be held in the King's Arms Tavern Garden as we did last year. Our lunch will be individual order and pay.

Those who want to attend the luncheon can walk from the French Cemetery to King's Arms Tavern garden (about 8 minutes). We are asked to enter from Francis Street; the walk leads to the seating in the garden. In case of rain we will be seated inside but not necessarily as a group.

Since the luncheon will be "Dutch Treat", no advance payment will be needed however your advance reservation is required due to the limited seating.

The Historian's Corner

The June selection "From the Historian's Bookshelf" is entitled "The Genuine Article: A Historian Looks at Early America", by Edmund S. Morgan: W.W. Norton & Company, New York, 2004.

"This book amounts to an intellectual autobiography... These pieces are thus a statement of what I have thought about early Americans during nearly seventy years in their company", writes Edmund S. Morgan in his introduction to "The Genuine Article", the title not only of this book but also a remarkably insightful essay devoted to our first president, George Washington.

Here, in the "Genuine Article", his first collection of essays in several decades, Morgan presents a rich and thrilling story that begins with the arrival of the first settlers in 1607 at the doomed Jamestown colony and ends as the Founding Fathers begin the arduous task of governing a formerly rebellious and often restless people.

"The Genuine Article" is also the Raffle Book for June.
