By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

## NSSAR National Congress Oration Contest

Alan Booth, our Chapter's Rumbaugh Oration contest winner, represented the Virginia Society at the National Congress in Winston-Salem, NC in July. Although he did not win, he did very well and was a crowd favorite.

Alan has already begun work on his 2012 oration which will be based upon one of the Patriots who died at the Palace in Colonial Williamsburg. Alexander Scammell participated in the raid on Fort William and Mary, the capture of Fort Ticonderoga, the fighting near Boston, the invasion of Canada and he was wounded at the battle of Saratoga. He became George Washington's adjutant and was appointed to command the first New Hampshire Regiment just prior to the siege at Yorktown. He was mortally wounded near Fusilier's Redoubt by one of Tarleton's dragoons. Cornwallis paroled him back to the allied Army and he was then sent to the hospital in Williamsburg where he died.

Alan is also considering writing for the Knight Essay contest and the Eagle Scout competition. We wish Alan well!"

#### **Freedom Park Interpretive Center**

The James City County Freedom Park Interpretive Center, just off of Centreville Road, is nearing completion. The structure contains about 3,000 square feet and will contain displays and exhibits to include a touch screen kiosk explaining various aspects of the historical significance of the site. One of the historical events that occurred there was the Engagement of Spencer's Ordinary on June 26, 1781. The Williamsburg Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution provided text and graphics about the engagement for one of the pages on the touch screen kiosk. The chapter also plans to eventually place a historical marker, similar in design to the one placed on Greensprings Road, elsewhere within the grounds of the park.

Construction at the intersection of Centerville Road and Longhill has been underway this summer and traffic lights are scheduled for installation soon. Freedom Park's next phase of improvement will be picnic and playground areas and parking lot completion. A ribbon cutting ceremony for the Interpretive Center is tentatively scheduled for the first week in October.

"From the Historian's Bookshelf" selection for September is an insightful and informative book that has provided me with hours of reading pleasure during the course on my rehab. The book is entitled *Liberty's Exiles: American Loyalists in the Revolutionary World*, by Maya Jasanoff, Alfred A. Knopf, New York, 2011.

A ground breaking history of the Revolutionary era, *Liberty's Exiles* tells the story of what happened to the tens of thousands of American loyalists left in the new United States as the last British troops pulled out of New York City on November 25, 1783 bringing the American Revolution to an end. Through painstaking archival

research and vivid storytelling, award-winning Maya Jasanoff re-creates the journeys of ordinary individuals whose lives were overturned by extraordinary events. As they dispersed across the British Empire, these loyalists carried things from their former homes revealing an enduring American influence on the wider British world.

If you have ever wondered or thought about what happened to those Americans who were on the loosing side of the American Revolution due to their loyalty to the Mother Country, then I heartily recommend "Liberty's Exiles" to your edification!
