

May 28th Memorial Day

The proceedings will begin at 10:00am in front of the Governor's Palace. Following brief opening remarks and wreath laying ceremony there, the march will begin with our chapter color guard following the Colonial Williamsburg Fife and Drums Corps. You are invited to fall in behind the procession. We will then march to the Palace Green Gate of Bruton Parish Church

and the French cemetery near the Williamsburg Inn for a wreath laying at each of those two sites.

There will be a shuttle from the Colonial Williamsburg employees' parking lot opposite the Colonial Capitol to the turnaround in front of Matthew Whaley School for the color guard and those having difficulty walking.

The Historian's Corner

June's selection "From the Historian's Bookshelf" is *An Essay on the Life of The Honourable Major-General Israel Putnam* addressed to the State Society of the Cincinnati in Connecticut and Published by Their Order, 1787, by David Humphreys; forward by William C. Dowling, and published by the Liberty Fund, Inc., Indianapolis, 2000.

David Humphreys, principal aide-de-camp to Putnam and subsequently to George Washington, divides the *Life of Israel Putnam* into two halves, the first being largely concerned with Putnam's deeds in the Seven Years' War---the "French and Indian War" of American history---the second being devoted to his role in the American Revolution.

Humphreys, always interested in telling the truth, is also consciously writing within a Plutarchan tradition that takes the truth about a biographical hero to be moral rather than circumstantial or factual. The point of Plutarchan biography, still the commanding model in that classically oriented age of Humphreys, is to give back to the community a sustaining image of its own

deepest values in the personality of the hero. That is what Humphreys had in mind when he states early in the *Life* that his ends will have been served if he produces in his American readers a desire to imitate the "domestic, manly and heroic virtues" of Israel Putnam

Bottom line, An Essay on the Life of the Honourable Major-General Israel Putnam is both an interesting but difficult to read account of the life of Israel Putnam. It is definitely not a book that can be read in a couple of days! Its difficulty to read is due to the fact that it is written in the style of prose current in the late 18th century. One has to disconnect their 21st century mindset and mentally place themselves back in 1787. It is a true document of that era, and should be read and appreciated as such.
