By signing the Declaration of Independence, the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

February 9th Luncheon Meeting

Our speaker for the February 9th meeting will be William Woodridge. His topic will be *Mapping the Revolution in Virginia*.

Bill is a graduate of Harvard College and the University of Virginia Law School. He is a trustee of the Virginia Historical Society and has served as president of the John Marshall Foundation and of the Norfolk Historical Society, as chair of the Friends of the Chrysler Museum's Historic Houses, on the steering committee of the map support groups at the Library of Congress and the Library of Virginia, and on the boards of the Library of Virginia Foundation and of public radio station WHRO and its foundation.

Bill bought his first Virginia map in Heidelberg in 1969 and over the course of

forty years assembled the most comprehensive privately owned collection of printed Virginia maps. In 2009 the Virginia Cartographical Society acquired the collection.

Bermuda Wreath Laying

Michael Elston, President of the George Washington Chapter, is going to Bermuda March 23-27 and will do a wreath laying for two famous Bermudian patriots, St. George Tucker and Thomas Tudor Tucker. Given that Williamsburg was St. George's home, he said he would be happy to have anyone from the Williamsburg Chapter who wants to make the trip join in the event. If anyone

The reception and wreath-laying to honor these two Bermuda-born Patriots of the Revolution is planned at the Historic Tucker House Museum in St. George's, Bermuda, most likely on March 25, 2013. The Tucker House was built in the 1750s and purchased by the Tuckers' brother, Henry Tucker, in 1775. The reception will be hosted by the Bermuda National Trust, and descendants of the Tucker family, the U.S. Consul General and officials of the Government of Bermuda will be invited to attend. The wreath-laying will be conducted by representatives of the SAR, DAR and CAR.

St. George Tucker (1752-1827) was a colonel of the Chesterfield County Militia and was wounded at Yorktown. After the war, he practiced law and then became professor of law at William & Mary. He later served on the Virginia Supreme Court and was appointed by President Madison as a United States District Judge in 1813. His home in Williamsburg is preserved and maintained as a part of Colonial Williamsburg.

Thomas Tudor Tucker (1745-1828) trained as a physician in Edinburgh, Scotland, and then settled in Charleston, South Carolina. He was elected to the South Carolina House of Representatives in 1776. In 1781 he joined the Continental Army as a hospital surgeon supporting the Southern Department, and served until 1783. South Carolina sent him as a delegate to the Continental Congress in 1787 and again in 1788. He served as a Member of Congress from South Carolina in the 1st and 2nd Congresses. President Thomas Jefferson appointed him as Treasurer of the United States in 1801, and he remained in

that position through the administrations of James Madison, James Monroe, and John Quincy Adams until his death in 1828.

Both St. George and Thomas Tudor Tucker are believed to have played a role in instigating the Bermuda Gunpowder Plot, which was led by their father, Henry Tucker. On August 14, 1775, a group of Bermudians stole the gunpowder from the colony's magazine and rolled the barrels to the sea where it was rowed to American sloops waiting offshore. In return, the Continental Congress exempted Bermuda from the trade embargo imposed on other colonies that remained loyal to the British Crown. St. George may have been on Bermuda at the time and may have actually participated in the event.

Historian's Corner

2012 was a banner year for the Williamsburg chapter in terms of new members being inducted into the Society of the Sons of the American Revolution. Due to this influx of new members, now is a good time to explain one of the on-going programs of our chapter called "From the Historian's Bookshelf: A program to encourage further reading and study of the Revolutionary War period."

Motivation for this program came in 2009 when VASSAR president Art Batten spoke to the chapter about enhancing our knowledge by reading more on this period's history. While listening to Art Batten's talk, the chapter historian came up with the idea of one way of encouraging chapter members to read was to share the books on this period from his own library as suggestions for future reading. He decided that each month he would review a book on the Revolutionary War, or the period, in the chapter newsletter. He also decided to bring

the featured book to that month's chapter meeting for display. That's what this program is all about. So, at the next chapter meeting look for the display on the name tag table, pick up the book of the month and browse the contents!

Now, for February's selection "From the Historian's Bookshelf" is a work entitled *Kings Mountain and Cowpens: Our Victory Was Complete*, by Robert W. Brown, Jr., History Press, Charleston, SC, 2009.

Brown states in his preface that there have been many excellent books written about the battles of Kings Mountain and Cowpens as separate events in the American revolution. Each work brings new information and provides insights into those battles. However, there has not been a work that ties these two critical Patriot victories together. In his book, Brown has attempted to provide an overview of and to explain the connections between the two engagements and how they directly affected the course of Cornwallis's campaign in the South and his eventual surrender at Yorktown.

The book is an easy read with good maps and pictures to support the text. Enjoy!
