Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War, five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left penniless. Twelve signer's houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

On Saturday, April 26, Don Swain, Jack Lee, Harley Stewart and I served as judges at the Virginia History Day held at Thomas Nelson Community College to review those history projects prepared by students that dealt with the time period of the American Revolutionary War. Bob White, an incoming member, joined us. We awarded a bronze medal, a certificate and a cash prize of \$100 to a high school student from Northern Virginia for a performance based on Abigail Adams. You may remember that students from Bedford won our awards last year, so there must be a very fine history teacher in Bedford.

On Monday, April 28, Ed Truslow (representing VASSAR), Jack Lee, Harley Stewart and I attended the annual birthday ceremony of James Monroe at Hollywood Cemetery in Richmond. The ceremony was very interesting. Hollywood Cemetery is worth a visit, particularly in Spring. Unfortunately, the rain was coming down in buckets.

Jack Lee and I traveled to Charles City County High School on Tuesday April 29, to award a medal and certificate to a member of the JROTC program at the School. Battle of Petersburg Commemoration

On Saturday April 19th, VASSAR VP Ed Truslow presented a wreath at Battersea Plantation House in Petersburg, Va. commemorating the 233rd anniversary of the battle there in April of 1781. At that battle the Americans were outnumbered by more than two to one and were pushed out of Petersburg.

Other wreath presenters were George Corbett, President of the Richmond SAR Chapter, Dawn Holmes on behalf of the Dames of the British Empire, and Barbara Atkinson Regent of the Colonel John Banister DAR Chapter. U.S. Army Brigadier General John O'Neill and British Lieutenant Colonel Alan Hoff jointly presented a wreath in memory of British Major General William Phillips who died of the fever at Petersburg. He is buried in nearby Blandford Church Cemetery and a memorial stone for him was placed there by the DAR in 1914.

Major General Phillips was captured at the Battle of Saratoga and spent three years in captivity at Charlottesville, Va. until he was exchanged for American General Benjamin Lincoln. Thomas Jefferson entertained General Phillips on several occasions and held him in high regard. Jefferson wrote that General Phillips was "the proudest man of the proudest nation on earth".
