THE BATTLE OF MOORE'S CREEK BRIDGE A FEBRUARY AMERICAN REVOLUTION EVENT



On February 26, in the evening, the Americans straddled the bridge. Lillington with 150 men waited on the east side of the Moore's Creek, and Caswell with 850 men were camped on the west. MacDonald's Loyalists, 1,600 strong but with arms for less than half that many, camped 6 miles away.

MacDonald had lost the race to the Moore's Creek Bridge and now had to decide whether to avoid fighting once more or to cut through their opponents. At a council-of-war, the younger leader carried the debate, and eventually all agreed that the enemy should be attacked. An element in the decision was the report by a scout that Col. Caswell's position lay on their side of the river and was thus vulnerable.

On February 27, at 1:00 A.M., the Loyalists set out on their march, with a party of 75 picked broadswords men under Captain John Campbell in the lead. By now, MacDonald had fallen ill, and McLeod was in command. The going was slow, for the route lay through thickets and swampy ground. During the night, Caswell abandoned the camp and withdrew across the creek. Once on the other side, his men removed the planks and greased the girders. Posting artillery to cover the bridge, they waited in darkness for the advancing Scots.

An hour before dawn, the Loyalists came upon Caswell's deserted camp and found the fires burning low. Moving on to nearby woods, Col. McLeod regrouped his men and passed the rallying cry - "King George and Broad Swords" - along the line. There, they waited for daybreak. Suddenly gunfire sounded near the bridge.

Though it was not yet light, McLeod couldn't wait any longer. Three cheers rang out, the signal for the attack, and the Loyalists rushed the partly demolished bridge with broadswords out and bagpipes skirling. Picking their way over the bridge and onto the opposite bank, they got within 30 paces of the American earthworks before they were met by a withering fire of musketry and artillery.


Nearly all the advance party were cut down, and the whole force soon retreated. It was all over in a few minutes. Pursuit by the Americans turned the British repulse into a rout.

"Medicine in Colonial America" By Jonathan L. Stolz, M.D.



February's speaker, Dr. Jonathan L. Stolz, presents an overview on how medicine was practiced in America's colonial period beginning in the early 17th century and ending at the conclusion of the Revolutionary War in 1783. The various components of healthcare during this era are fascinating stories.

Up to the end of British rule, officials in the mother country played only indirect roles in the small-scale development of America's formal medicine. The medical initiatives in these years were like so many accomplishments in our young country all from within and a product of our uniqueness as a people.

Doctor Stolz is a graduate of The Hill School, Trinity College, and Temple University School of Medicine. He completed an internship at the Tulane University Division of Charity Hospital and a residency in radiology at the Hospital of the University of Pennsylvania. For thirty years he practiced in Reading, Pennsylvania before retiring and moving to Williamsburg.

In retirement he continues his longtime study of the history of medicine. Since 2008 he has taught courses on the subject at the College of William & Mary's Christopher Wren Association. He has written medical history related commentaries for local and national periodicals. His book, "Medicine from Cave Dweller to Millennials," was published in August 2018.

FEBRUARY BOOK RAFFLE







Workshops

As listed on the attached agenda, we will be conducting four (4) different workshops on Friday night (two 1-hour sessions from 7 to 8 pm, one 1-1/2 hour session from 7 to 8:30 pm and one 1 hour session from 7 to 9 pm). An overview of these workshops is listed below to assist in choosing which workshop(s) may best suit your needs.

Workshop 1 - Admin/Awards; Facilitators - Treasurer Rick Elofson and Secretary Wayne Rouse

Workshop will focus on required tax returns, budgets, membership changes and awards.

Workshop 2 – Americanism; Facilitator – 2nd Vice President Jeff Thomas Workshop will discuss the importance of the annual report and how to input the data.
