Board member Jeff Wooldridge has been working with Colonial Williamsburg on Memorial Day plans. While CW is not able to hold a parade as in the past, a limited participation event is being considered. Details will be provided by email by Secretary Duncan McIver later when they are finalized.



A May event from 255 years ago... "If this be treason, then make the most of it."



On May 30, 1765 Patrick Henry, with a series of resolutions introduced to the Virginia legislature in a speech spoke in an attempt to persuade the House of Burgess to pass his resolutions that condemned Parliament's Stamp Act, which taxed paperwork of various kinds, including wills and playing cards. As he spoke, he said that Caesar had his Brutus, that Charles had his Cromwell, and that George the Third.... But at the mention of the name of the king, many of those who opposed the resolutions erupted with shouts of "Treason," "Expel that man," and "Silence the Traitor." Determined to finish his statement, Henry shouted above the tumult, "George the Third may profit by their example!" There were more calls of "Treason," to which Henry replied "If this be treason, then make the most of it." It is interesting to note that a young Thomas Jefferson, though not yet elected to the House of

Burgesses, was present at this debate as a spectator. It was at this time that the revolutionary fire was lit in the heart of the man who would become the author of our Declaration of Independence and later our President.



Patriot Doctor Saves Thousands from Yellow Fever in 1793

Benjamin Rush (January 1746 – April 1813) a signor of the *Declaration of Independence*, was a civic leader in Philadelphia as well as a physician, and educator. He was probably early America's most famous doctor.

During the summer of 1793 Philadelphia, the young nation's capital and largest city, experienced an unusually hot and prolonged heat wave that generated an outbreak of Yellow Fever. Most, who could, fled the city including the President and Mrs. Washington. Of those who remained, thousands fell victim to the scourge of the "yellow jack" epidemic.

Dr. Rush became a leader in the fight against Yellow Fever. He was urged to leave the city as others had done, but said in response, "I have resolved to stick to my principles, my practice, and my patients to the last extremity." His example was an inspiration to the people of the beleaguered city.

A product of 18th century Anglo-American medical practices, Rush embraced the theory that illnesses were caused by imbalances among bodily fluids such as blood, phlegm and bile – "humors" (chemical systems regulating human behavior). Restoring a proper "humoral balance" would lead to restored health. He was, however, something of a pioneer in that he believed epidemics could be prevented by improved sanitation practices. He advocated cleaning the docks, pumping out bilge water from ships tied up along the city's wharfs, cleaning sewers frequently, washing streets during warm weather, emptying toilets more frequently, and eating less meat during the hot summer months. Rush claimed that, "To every natural evil, Heaven has provided an antidote."

As the epidemic continued to grow and in need of help, Dr. Rush turned to Philadelphia's free black community in the belief that this group was immune to the disease. African-Americans worked untold hours nursing the sick and dying, driving carts, making coffins, and digging graves.

Rush himself fell ill to Yellow Fever and his own treatment methods were administered by assistants. He recovered.

By mid-October an early freeze on stagnant pools of water where mosquitoes bred greatly decreased infections and by November the epidemic was over. Residents returned to their homes and work.

Dr. Benjamin Rush is credited with saving the lives of over 6,000 people through his treatment practices, his dedication and his perseverance. It was said that his heroism during the 1793 epidemic in Philadelphia endeared him "even to his political enemies."



In its place will be a nationally-televised special: The National Memorial Day Parade: America Stands Tall.


