Williamsburg Chapter Virginia Society Sons of the American Revolution

By signing the Declaration of Independence,

the fifty-six Americans pledged their lives, fortunes, and sacred honor. Nine died of wounds during the Revolutionary War. Five were captured or imprisoned. Wives and children were jailed, mistreated, or left pennibess. Invelve signers' houses were burned to the ground. No signer defected. Their honor, like their nation remained intact.

WHO WAS SGT. MOSES ADAMS?

A Soldier of the American Revolution November 30, 1748 – June 13, 1778 In 2011 the Sons of the American Revolution [SAR] named one of its National Youth Programs "The Sgt. Moses Adams Memorial Middle School Brochure Contest," honoring a representative Soldier of the American Revolution who made the ultimate sacrifice. Moses Adams of New Marlborough, Massachusetts joined with his brothers and neighbors and marched with their Minute Man Company in response to the Alarm of Lexington and Concord, April 21, 1775. He then joined the Continental Army and rose to the rank of Sergeant in the 13th Massachusetts Line. He died at Valley Forge June 13, 1778. The SAR dedicates its annual middle school program, as a living memorial, to honor the thousands of men and woman who, like Sgt. Adams, gave their lives for the cause of freedom, and also to their families who suffered their loss for generations.

Our September 12TH speaker

Mr. Ed Ayres Historian, Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation

Mr. Ayres's talk is entitled "Lafayette's Military Leadership during the Virginia Campaign of 1781" In the spring of 1781, the Marquis de Lafayette was given an almost impossible task- to defend Virginia from an invading British force with only a handful of Continental light infantry, and supported by poorly trained militiamen and a few recruits. Although he was quite young and relatively inexperienced, Lafayette proved himself up to the challenge. This talk will look at how he managed to limit the depredations of a much larger force and keep the British at bay until the climatic events of October

Mr. Ed Ayres has been the Historian at the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation since 1988. Prior to this position, he was the Historian at The Flowerdrew Hundred Foundation, the research historian at Southside Historical sites of William and Mary, and an associate Historian at The Colonial Williamsburg Foundation.

Mr. Ayres received a Bachelor of Arts (History) from Hampden-Sydney, A master of Arts (American History) from The University of Virginia, and was a Ph.D. Candidate in American History from the University of Virginia.

Flag Recognition

A continuing review of our flags from the Revolution to the present



The Liberty flag was designed, by commission, in 1775 by Colonel William Moultrie, to prepare for war with Great Britain.

It was flown by his troops in the successful defense of Sullivan's Island against the British fleet in June 1776.

Fighting back stridently during a ten-hour bombardment and siege, Moultrie's forces (primarily the 2nd South Carolina Regiment) eventually led the British to withdraw entirely saving Charleston.

During the battle, the flag was actually shot away, but Sergeant William Jasper ran out in the open and hoisted it again, rallying the troops until a new stand could be provided. The story of this dramatic event, along with the pivotal role of the battle itself, earned the flag a place in the hearts of the people of South Carolina, as well as cementing it as a symbol of liberty in the South, and the new confederacy in general.

It therefore became the standard of the South Carolina militia, and when the war officially ended with the liberation of Charleston, on December 14, 1782, it was presented by General Nathanael Green's "Southern Continental & Militia Army," as the first American flag to be displayed in the South.

The symbol in the top left corner of the flag is a crescent, some say it is a gorget, others say it is a crescent moon, but all texts from the time describe it as simply a "crescent".

From The Chaplain Jim Morford

About five weeks into the Constitutional Convention of 1787 when they were attempting to draft the U. S. Constitution, their efforts were a failure. As things were beginning to break up and delegates return home to their states, Benjamin Franklin challenged them and called them to prayer.

He told them:

"In this situation of this Assembly, groping as it were in the dark to find political truth, and scarce able to distinguish it when presented to us, how has it happened, sir, that we have not hitherto once thought of humbly applying to the Father of Lights to illuminate our understanding? In the beginning of the contest with Great Britain, when we were sensible of danger, we had daily prayer in this room for the Divine protection. Our prayers, sir, were heard, and they were graciously answered. And have we now forgotten that powerful Friend? Or do we imagine we no longer need His assistance? And if a sparrow cannot fall to the ground without His notice, is it probable that an empire can rise without His aid? I therefore beg leave to move that henceforth prayers imploring the assistance of Heaven, and its blessings on our deliberations, be held in this Assembly every morning before we proceed to business."

George Washington, President of the Constitutional Convention, recorded that they went to church to hear an address. At the church, the Rev. William Rogers (not to be confused with Rev Roger Williams) had a special prayer for the Constitutional Convention:

[W]e fervently recommend to thy fatherly notice ... our federal convention.... [F]avor them, from day to day, with thy immediate presence; be Thou their wisdom and their strength! Enable them to devise such measures as may prove happily instrumental for healing all divisions and promoting the good of the great whole; ... that the United States of America may furnish the world with one example of a free and permanent government.... May we ... continue, under the influence of republican virtue, to partake of all the blessings of cultivated and civilized society. AMEN

After five weeks of failure, following a recess and time of prayer, they reconvened and in only ten weeks produced the document that has become the longest on-going constitution in the history of the world.

How an Enslaved Man-Turned-Spy Helped Secure Victory at the Battle of Yorktown





James Armistead provided critical intel to the Continental Army as a double agent during the Revolutionary War.

In the autumn of 1781, the American colonial army fought in the Battle of Yorktown, the final and arguably most consequential battle for American independence from British rule. By all accounts, this monumental victory, which forced the surrender of British General Lord Cornwallis and his squadron of nearly 9,000 troops, would not have been possible without crucial insider intelligence from James Armistead, a patriot who worked briefly yet effectively as a double agent for the Continental Army throughout the Revolutionary War.

Before actively choosing to serve the budding republic that denied him his freedom, Armistead already had a fairly close-up view of the conflict: His owner, William Armistead managed the military supplies for the state of Virginia after the war began in 1775. In 1780, James and William moved from the Virginia capital of Williamsburg to the new capital, Richmond, and the following summer James got permission to join the armed forces himself.

Lafayette wrote "This is to certify that the Bearer has done essential services to me while I had the honour to command in this State. His Intelligence from the ennemy's [sic] camp were industriously collected and most faithfully delivered. He perfectly acquitted himself with some important commissions I gave him and appears to me entitled to every reward his situation can admit of." As a result, in 1787 Armistead became a free man. Appreciative of the Frenchman who helped him acquire his freedom, Armistead changed his name to James Armistead Lafayette.

Armistead went on to move nine miles south of New Kent, Virginia, where he'd spent so much of his life as another man's property. He lived a peaceful life as a husband and father, bought 40 acres of land to farm, and received \$40 a year from the Virginia legislature for his invaluable work to liberate a nation.
